Through a diverse range of programs, GYLC not only educates youth on climate science but also fosters their leadership potential and supports them in driving real-world impact.

With a strong foundation in private sector engagement, curriculum co-creation, job placement, and youth entrepreneurship, GYLC is committed to shaping a generation of climate-conscious leaders who can drive sustainable change in their communities and beyond.

GYLC is a registered 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization (EIN 86-1803624), rooted in a mission to build youth capacity for a more resilient and sustainable future.



Our Mission and Vision

Mission

Expand youth's knowledge about climate science, equip them with leadership skills to take individual and collective action, and enable them to launch businesses that contribute to climate mitigation or adaptation.

Vision

The world's youth, especially those in the most climate vulnerable countries, are empowered and engaged to tackle the climate crisis.

The Climate Crisis: Problems We Address

The earth's atmosphere contains an excess one trillion tonnes of Greenhouse Gases (GHGs), with an additional 51 billion tonnes emitted every year. The result is a more rapidly warming atmosphere, with devastating consequences for our planet and its people.

Climate Impacts Today:

- Dangerous heat waves and droughts
- Increased flooding and severe weather events
- Rising food insecurity
- Displacement of vulnerable populations
- Loss of biodiversity

These impacts disproportionately affect countries in the Global South—regions that have contributed least to global emissions yet face the most severe consequences.

The Leadership Gap

These climate-vulnerable countries need effective leadership to navigate both mitigation and adaptation in the coming decades. Supporting today's youth to become tomorrow's leaders requires:

- Deepening their knowledge of climate science and policy
- Equipping them with leadership skills to act locally and advocate globally
- Investing in climate-conscious initiatives that build resilience while creating economic opportunity

GYLC addresses this critical gap by focusing specifically on youth in the most vulnerable regions, providing them with the tools, knowledge, and networks they need to drive change.

Our Strategic Approach

GYLC has established a three-pronged strategy to build the leadership capacity of youth in climate-vulnerable countries:

1.

Knowledge Building

We deepen understanding of climate science through:

- Expert-led educational sessions
- Peer-to-peer knowledge exchange
- Access to cutting-edge climate research
- Translating complex climate concepts into actionable insights

2.

Leadership Development

We cultivate essential leadership skills through:

- Adaptive leadership training
- Collaborative problem-solving experiences
- Public speaking and advocacy techniques
- Project management and implementation tools

3.

Action & Implementation

We support youth-led climate projects through:

- Seed funding for promising initiatives
- Mentorship and technical guidance
- Connection to global networks and resources
- Platforms to showcase impact and scale solutions

This integrated approach ensures that youth not only understand the climate crisis but are empowered to address it effectively through both individual action and collective mobilization.

Our Programs

Education & Leadership Development for Climate Action

GYLC's "Education and Leadership Development for Climate Action" program empowers youth to become effective agents of change in the climate crisis. Initiatives like the TikTok For Climate Action partnership exemplify this approach, engaging youth, particularly in Bangladesh, through inclusive workshops.

These workshops feature diverse voices from civil society, academia, climate science, mental health, and government, fostering dialogue, building bridges, and cultivating active citizenship. Alongside this, GYLC strengthens the capacity of young climate entrepreneurs, providing them with the tools and skills to lead and innovate in the climate space.

TikTok For Climate Action Initiative



The TikTok for Climate Action initiative is a year-long partnership between TikTok and GYLC, launched on September 4, 2023, in Dhaka, Bangladesh. Aimed primarily at Bangladeshi youth, the initiative focuses on education and leadership development for climate action. GYLC, with local implementation support from the Bangladesh Youth Leadership Center (BYLC), is organizing 10 workshops featuring diverse leaders to promote inclusiveness, bridge divides, and encourage active youth citizenship.

Key Workshops

Road to COP28: Youth's Aspirations and Priorities

Dhaka, November 22, 2023

To empower youth and amplify their voices in climate discourse, GYLC, in collaboration with TikTok and BYLC, convened a crucial workshop in Dhaka titled "Road to COP28: Youth's Aspirations and Priorities." This event served as a vital platform for 50 young people to articulate their perspectives and develop their capacity to engage with the COP28 climate discussions.

The dialogue featured insights from key speakers, including COP28 youth delegate Shamim Ahmed Mridha, who emphasized the importance of youth leadership in advocating for issues like loss and damage funding, and climate activist Aruba Faruque, who highlighted the need for youth to drive systemic change.



Voices from Climate Vulnerable Communities

Chattogram, November 25, 2023

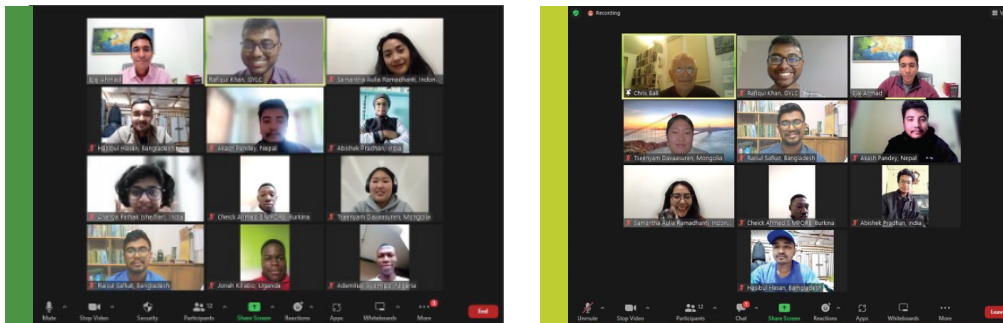
GYLC's "Road to COP28: Voices from Climate Vulnerable Communities" workshop, held in Chattogram, amplified youth perspectives in the lead-up to COP28. Recognizing Chattogram's vulnerability to climate change, the event provided a platform for young people to express their concerns and aspirations.

Climate Activist Shamsuddin Illius emphasized the importance of youth building their capacity through climate knowledge. Ismail Hosan Maharaj, Project Coordinator at Eco-Network Global, highlighted the effectiveness of infotainment and video content on social media for raising climate change awareness among youth.



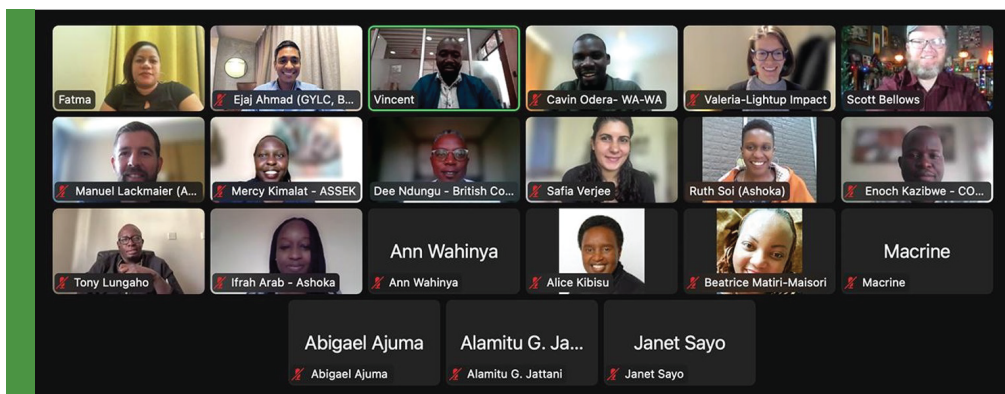
GYLC Leadership Workshops

GYLC held a three-day leadership workshop for youth climate champions from Mongolia, Nigeria, Uganda, Burkina Faso, India, Nepal, Indonesia, and Bangladesh. The workshop, featuring a session on exercising leadership in times of crisis by GYLC CEO Ejaj Ahmad, aimed to hone the participants' leadership and project management skills.



With a closing ceremony including a special address by Sir Christopher Ball, former professor at Oxford University, the champions concluded the workshop ready to embark on their climate mitigation and adaptation projects in their respective communities.

Additionally, GYLC CEO Ejaj Ahmad led a leadership session for social entrepreneurs and development professionals in East Africa, contributing to the Ashoka Visionary Program Module on New Leadership.



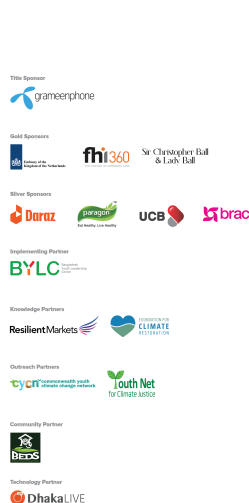
Global Youth Climate Summit

GYLC's Global Youth Climate Summit program empowers young people to lead the fight against climate change. These three-day hybrid summits bring together approximately 500 youth from around the world to address the intensifying climate crisis and its disproportionate impact on today's generation.

At each summit, environmental activists, climate experts, and thought leaders engage with youth through interactive sessions and small group activities, building leadership skills and driving collaborative climate action.

Global Youth Climate Summit 2022

Khulna, Bangladesh, October 20-22, 2022



The Global Youth Climate Summit 2022, organized by GYLC in partnership with the Bangladesh Youth Leadership Center (BYLC), convened in Khulna, Bangladesh, bringing together 500 youth and global experts from five continents.

This impactful hybrid event served as a crucial platform to address the urgent need for climate action, particularly in climate-vulnerable countries like Bangladesh. Discussions emphasized the gravity of the climate crisis, as highlighted by GYLC founder Ejaj Ahmad, who stressed the need for urgent mitigation, adaptation, and restoration efforts.

Eminent climate scientist Sir David King provided key insights into the science of climate change, explaining the critical levels of greenhouse gasses in the atmosphere. The summit fostered vital dialogue on intergenerational collaboration, climate justice, and youth-led solutions, with participation from diverse thought leaders, including International Affairs Adviser to the Prime Minister of Bangladesh Dr. Gowher Rizvi, British High Commissioner to Bangladesh Robert Chatterton Dickson, and various youth climate activists.

In addition to plenary sessions, the summit included activities such as a mangrove plantation and an eco-village visit for in-person delegates. The event underscored the critical role of youth in driving change and shaping a sustainable future, and highlighted GYLC's commitment to empowering youth in climate-vulnerable regions.

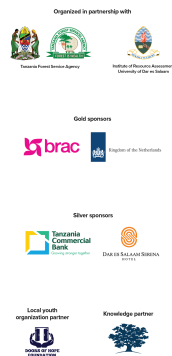

Global Youth Climate Summit 2023

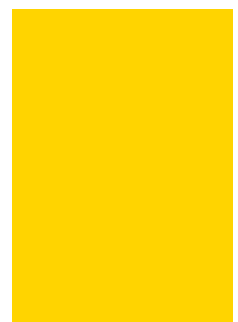
Dar es Salaam, Tanzania, October 4-7, 2023



The Global Youth Climate Summit 2023, convened by GYLC in collaboration with the Tanzania Forest Service Agency, the Ministry of Natural Resources and Tourism, and the Institute of Resource Assessment at the University of Dar es Salaam, was held in Dar es Salaam from October 4-7.

This four-day event brought together 200 youth delegates and speakers from 24 countries, along with over 300 virtual participants, to amplify the voices of young leaders from the Global South in the fight against climate change. The summit empowered youth through practical experiences and knowledge in climate science, climate leadership, advocacy, and environmental sustainability, with a focus on fostering social enterprise.

It aimed to equip youth with the tools to mitigate and adapt to the impacts of climate change, featuring immersive learning experiences such as field visits to mangrove plantations and the Pugu Kazimzumbwi Forest. The summit featured high-profile speakers, alongside prominent youth climate activists.

Youth Climate Champions

The Youth Climate Champions program, a key component of GYLC's commitment to action, identifies and invests in promising young leaders dedicated to tackling the climate crisis. Through a rigorous selection process following each Global Youth Climate Summit, ten passionate delegates are chosen as Youth Climate Champions.

Recognizing the crucial role of youth in driving change, GYLC provides each champion with a \$1,000 award to support the implementation of their innovative climate mitigation or adaptation projects within their communities. This initiative directly empowers young individuals to translate their passion into tangible impact.

Program Components:

- \$1,000 seed funding per Champion
- Three-day intensive leadership workshop
- Ongoing mentorship and technical support
- Global platform to showcase project impact
- Connection to a network of climate leaders

Selection Criteria:

- Project viability and climate impact potential
- Community engagement and inclusivity
- Innovative approach to local challenges
- Leadership potential and commitment
- Potential for scaling or replication

Champion Stories



Samantha Aulia Ramadhanti | Indonesia

Project: Tanam Taman Mangrove

Samantha's project focuses on mangrove ecosystem restoration and education in coastal Indonesia. Achievements include:

- Development of mangrove ecosystem educational materials
- Training for 70 participants on ecosystem preservation
- Recruitment of 76 community volunteers
- Planting of 1,000 mangrove trees
- Media partnerships reaching thousands through IG Live and radio broadcasts

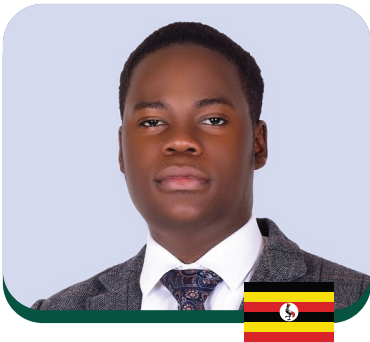


Ademilusi Ayomipo Emmanuel | Nigeria

Project: Climate Education Workshops

Ademilusi's project focuses on climate literacy in Nigerian schools. Key impacts include:

- Four workshops conducted in Lagos
- 120+ students engaged in climate education
- Development of youth-friendly climate curriculum
- Student-led brainstorming on local climate solutions
- Creation of school climate action clubs

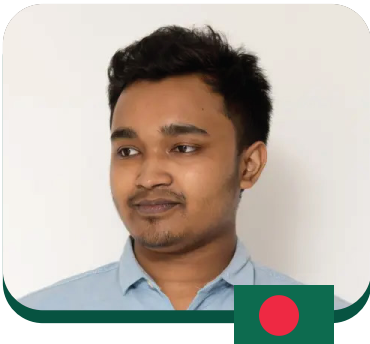


Jonah Kirabo | Uganda

Project: 5 Million Trees Initiative

Jonah's ambitious project aims to plant 5 million trees by 2025. Progress includes:

- Strategic partnerships with schools and community groups
- Social media campaign to drive awareness
- Development of youth tree-planting brigades
- Integration of climate education with reforestation efforts
- Progress tracking system to monitor tree survival rates



Hasibul Hasan | Bangladesh

Project: Greener Initiative to Turn Waste into Compost

Hasibul's project addresses both waste management and sustainable agriculture. Accomplishments include:

- Construction of a community compost plant
- Distribution of waste collection bins
- Educational campaign reaching 200+ community members
- Workshop at the University of Chittagong
- Partnership with the Department of Agriculture Extension
- Free compost distribution to local farmers

Through these individual champions, GYLC translates climate knowledge into tangible community-level action while developing the next generation of environmental leaders.

Awareness & Policy Advocacy

GYLC actively fosters climate awareness and empowers youth to shape policy by engaging collaboratively with government, the private sector, and civil society. Recognizing the importance of youth voices in driving change, GYLC organizes events to raise awareness on critical climate issues and equips young people with the tools to participate meaningfully in policymaking processes.

This includes supporting youth in developing policy documents, such as youth manifestos, to articulate their expectations and recommendations to political parties and governing bodies. Furthermore, GYLC amplifies youth perspectives on the global stage through active participation in international forums like the United Nations Climate Change Conferences (COP).

GYLC at COP28

Dubai, UAE November–December 2023



GYLC expanded its global presence at COP28 through:

- Participation in key panel discussions on sustainability skills for youth
- Presentation of the Dar es Salaam Youth Climate Declaration priorities
- Strategic partnerships with World Bank, Majra (National CSR Fund, UAE), and Deutsche Bank representatives
- Amplification of Global South youth perspectives on adaptation and climate finance

Youth Priorities for COP28: Dar es Salaam Youth Climate Declaration

Over 60% of the Global South's population is youth, making their engagement in the fight against climate change not just essential, but critical. At the recent hybrid GYLC Global Youth Climate Summit in Dar es Salaam in October 2023, 500 youth convened to highlight their top priorities.

Among them, 200 in-person delegates and speakers from 24 countries emphasized key issues that demand attention at COP28:

- Enhanced funding for loss and damage
- Investment in locally-led adaptation
- Support for climate education
- Integration of indigenous knowledge
- Youth representation in climate governance

Through these efforts, GYLC ensures that youth perspectives inform policy decisions at both national and international levels.

Global Engagements

GYLC has established key partnerships and relationships across multiple countries to expand our impact in climate-vulnerable regions:



Ethiopia | January 16, 2023

In Addis Ababa, GYLC met with youth environmental activists and co-founders of Enfluencers Network, Jodahi B. Petros and Nahom Fekadu. Given Ethiopia's significant youth demographic, GYLC aims to collaborate with young Ethiopian activists and social entrepreneurs to empower them with leadership skills and climate science education for a sustainable future.



Tanzania | January 25, 2023

GYLC CEO Ejaj Ahmad met with Dr. Dos Santos Silayo, Commissioner and CEO of the Tanzania Forest Services Agency, and his team in Dar es Salaam to discuss potential collaborations on engaging youth in climate action within Tanzania's national forest reserves and broader natural resource management.



Uganda | January 20, 2023

In Kampala, GYLC engaged in a productive dialogue with inspiring youth leaders: Sadrach Nirere (End Plastic Pollution), Tusiime Kenneth (PROTECTYL), Edwin Muhumuza (Youth Go Green), and Susan Nanduddu (African Center for Trade and Development). This exchange explored opportunities to empower youth in climate action across Uganda.



Tanzania | May 24, 2023

In preparation for the Global Youth Climate Summit held in Dar es Salaam (October 4-7), the GYLC team conducted crucial preparatory meetings with key partners and supporters, including Professor Dos Santos Silayo, CEO and Conservation Commissioner of the Tanzania Forest Services Agency, and Mr. Zlatan Milišić, UN Resident Representative.



Tanzania | January 28, 2023
